Research from Fuller Institute shows that 40 to 50 percent of kids who graduate from a church or youth group will fail to stick with their faith in college. Something I have been thinking a lot about lately is family ministry and how to equip parents to be their children's main faith shapers. Since I have been helping with the middle school and youth students and have been preparing for my adult education class called Sticky Faith, I would like to use this opportunity to share a little bit about how to help a child's faith stick after they leave your household or our congregation. It is a team effort to raise up a child in the faith and that includes the entire congregation. To give credit where credit is due, all the research and quotes in this article are from the book "Sticky Faith" by Dr. Kara Powell

and Dr. Chap Clark. Sticky Faith is where a young adult's faith "sticks" with them and guides their life when they move out of their childhood support structures and begin making big decisions of their own. Research has also shown that when you ask a group of graduating seniors to rank the group they received top support from, they will say their parents are their number one source for receiving support. But for parents, it is more than their support that shapes your child, it's who they are.

"Most teenagers and their parents may not realize it, but a lot of research in the sociology of religion suggests that the most important social influence in shaping young people's religious lives is the religious life modeled and taught to them by their parents." So how do we help our kids develop a Sticky Faith? With prayer and the help of the Holy Spirit we need to help kids discover what it means to trust Christ and draw close to Him. "In life and faith, growth is a process. Our job as parents throughout this process is twofold: First, we help our kids learn to trust God and create the kind of environment where they are able to explore faith and trust while practicing their freedom to respond in love. Second, we model an unconditional, nonjudgmental, and ever-embracing love in which our kids can do nothing that jeopardizes or even lessens that love. We suggest three ways to help foster this kind of faith: teach your kids that obedience is our response to trusting God, frame all family discussions and activities as opportunities to know and trust Christ, and respond with grace when your child misbehaves."

As a congregation, what can we do? The variable most correlated with mature faith in high school and college is involvement in intergenerational worship and relationships. It is important to surround our young people with five adults who know their name, pray for them, and support them when they fall. An interview study has shown one of the primary ways a church can contribute to a kids' faith is by providing intergenerational relationships and connections. Parents are more grateful for these relationships above and beyond even peer community, worship, Bible study, and other communal spiritual practices. So, what is your role? Go find a young person to become one of their five! There is a lot more to share on this topic. I hope I will see you at the Sticky Faith class on Sunday mornings so we can continue to talk about it.

# **PARENT CORNER**



#### Some ideas of how to create a Sticky Faith for your kids.

- God talks provide opportunities to integrate faith and the Lord into our normal conversation.
- Go deeper with your kids. If they only offer Sunday School answers, ask why. Or what makes you say that? Or as we trust Jesus for our entertainment and fun, how does that change how we make our weekend plans?
- Schedule family giving meetings when you talk about how the family will give their money.
- Build into your family life regular patterns that remind you that all your money belongs to God.
- Offer to pray for your waiter or waitress at the restaurant.
- Take on a community service project together.
- Make dinner time special by giving the 30 minutes before and after to fellowship. Make dinner together and clean up together.
- Open your home to those who need to experience a family.
- Create family traditions.
- Explore with them how their family was shaped in both environment and genetics-make a family tree.
- Debrief about your child's day-focus the conversation on how they felt about the day, where they felt like they could be themselves, and what held them back from doing so at other times.
- At birthdays, have each person pray a word of thanksgiving for the unique gift of the one whose birthday it is. Bless the child with an affirmation of their character and place in the family.




#### MISSION OUTREACH TO TRINITY FIRST

# Focus on the Family of Cross View by Paul Emmel

#### CONTINUING TO SERVE THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Cross View is fortunate to have among its family Pastor Emeritus Robert Schmidt who served many years in the overseas mission field and later as professor at Concordia College, Portland. His special interest is in missiology and current international affairs. He lectures to community groups and shares his expertise in the following interview.



# Q. From your knowledge of mission history, where do you see the LCMS today?

A. Like many other denominations it is getting smaller and weaker. Not only is it closing some congregations, the number of seminary graduates to serve congregations is also small. I believe the LCMS missed an opportunity several years ago to certify dedicated and equipped lay people for word and sacrament ministry, modeled after the ministry in the book of Acts. This would have allowed the synod to continue to serve smaller congregations and begin new specialized ministries.

# Q. What mission important opportunities do you see for Cross View in the next few years?

A. I believe the community events such as EasterFest, Oktoberfest, and others have been successful and should be continued. It may also be possible to help some other congregations that will be fighting for their existence in a few years.

# Q. What mission lessons can Cross View learn from its past?

A. Cross View has been exceptionally successful in the raising of funds for the dental clinic in Kenya, the water project in Guatemala, and the Thanksgiving events at Trinity First. I believe that in these efforts we copy Christ and his demonstration of the coming Kingdom in healing, feeding, and helping others as part of the good news he announced in Mark 1:15.

Q. In retrospect, what were some highlights of your vocation as both a missionary and a college teacher?

A. My biggest thrill was to be able to connect the Gospel to people with issues in a different culture. In Africa it meant applying the Gospel to people in an animistic culture, sometimes using their name for the high God. On a college campus the task was to connect it with an academic, often secular, understanding of the world. Is capitalism a false god? What about nationalism?

Q. How do you seek to represent Christ in the world?

A. I have the opportunity to lecture on contemporary issues in a retirement community and, when appropriate, illumine the discussion with reference to Christ and the Christian faith. I also work alongside the Indian community that worships at Cross View and, when invited, preach at local churches as the ambassador of POBLO.

# Q. How has Cross View supported you in your personal faith life?

A. Cross View's regular ministry and the fellowship of our small group ministry has been very valuable. Cross View and its members were especially supportive at the death of my wife, and I appreciated that very much.

# Q. What can Cross View parents do to keep their children active in church?

A. If they will talk, listen. According to many reports many youth are fighting depression. While some of that is for personal reasons, others are because of the hate in communication and the seeming hopelessness of the world's future. The application of Christian hope to some actual problems is really needed.

#### Q. What keeps you vital and hopeful?

A. Jesus said that the Kingdom of God was near. It seemed preposterous at the time in an occupied country with uneven wealth and facing the destruction of the capital and the entire nation. If our churches are weak, their whole temple is totally destroyed. Yet, he proclaimed the nearness of the kingdom and backed it up with healing, feeding, teaching, and loving. It started small, like a mustard seed, but it is still growing.
